



Five Different Types of Prompts for Dialogic Reading (CROWD)

The acronym CROWD (Morgan & Meier, 2008) refers to five different types of prompts that teachers can use to get the children involved in the story:

- Completion prompts Leave a blank at the end of the sentence and invite children to supply a word to complete the sentence, e.g., "The brown bear saw a ..."
- **R**ecall prompts Ask questions about the events and characters in the story, e.g., What did the brown bear see?
- Open-ended prompts Encourage children to talk about what is happening in a picture, e.g., Can you guess what the teacher sees?
- What, where, when and why questions prompt Ask questions beginning with "what", "where", "when" and "why" that focus on the pictures in the book, e.g., Why did the goldfish say it could see the teacher?
- Distancing prompts Relate the story to the children's experiences as this allows them to practise conversational and storytelling skills, e.g., Where have you seen these animals before? and What is something red that you can see?
